1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science & Late Nasaruddinbhai Panjwani Commerce College Armori was established on 4th June 1981, under the flagship of Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Armori. Our institution has won a wide acclaim as the most dedicated and committed institution catering education to the underprivileged, socially and economically oppressed students of this tribal, rural and backward region. Our college is affiliated to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. Gadchiroli district is situated on the North-Eastern side of Maharashtra state and is characterized by continuous violent naxalite activities that disrupt the public life of this tribal and rural area. The founder President of Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Armori and a reputed social reformer Hon'ble Late Wamanraoji Wanmali found an unpleasant situation of education of this area and established this institution in 1981 with a clear vision of providing education to the backward, tribal, rural and underprivileged sections of this area.

The college is recognized by UGC under section 2(f) and 12(B) and is the only NAAC re-accredited 'A' Grade (3.02 CGPA, 2017) college in Gadchiroli district. Beside education and curricular activity the college implements a range of community based activities that inculcate among our students the teaching and preaching of great personalities like Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar, Shivaji Maharaj, Mahatma Phule, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj etc.

Ours is a multi-disciplinary institution that offers 04 UG programmes – B.A. with 09 Courses, B.Sc. with 08 courses, B.Com., B.Sc. (Home Science), 04 P.G. courses (Marathi, History, Economics, Sociology) in Arts faculty, 04 P.G. courses (Mathematics, Chemistry, Geology, Zoology) in Science faculty. Gondwana University Gadchiroli approved 05 Research Centres for Ph.D. (IHLRSS) in Mathematics, Zoology, Marathi, Sociology and History. Under skill initiative the college runs UGC sponsored Community College with Certificate, Diploma and Advance Diploma course in Dress Designing and Tailoring, specially designed for women students of this area. The college runs 17 career oriented programmes/ certificate courses, Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Ambedkar Study and Research Centre. The college is now entering 4th consecutive cycle of quality assessment and accreditation. Adhering to our vision and mission and recommendations of the last NAAC Peer Team, the college has implemented a wide variety of qualitative activities to enhance quality teaching-learning aiming at the holistic development of our students.

In the academic session 2020-21 the students strength is 1767 at UG and PG and 08 Ph.D. scholars. We have 30 permanent teachers, 22 temporary teachers and 15 non-teaching staff. Teachers form the backbone of any academic institution. 15 of our teachers have Ph.D. and 02 have submitted Ph.D. thesis for evaluation and 06 are pursuing Ph.D. 13 of faculties are Ph.D. supervisors. A majority of our teachers have completed minor and major research projects and some teachers are working on government bodies.

We have adequate infrastructural facilities to provide the best possible ambiance for teaching-learning, sports and cultural activities. The campus is spread over an area of 14892.43 sq.mtr. (3.68 acres) with a built up area of 9448.33 Sqmtr. Our infrastructure comprises of conference halls, indoor stadium well equipped laboratories, gymnasium, ICT enabled classrooms, well resourced library, girls hostel, roof solar panels on the campus, spacious playground, green campus etc. The large family of management, teaching, non-teaching staff, students, alumni, parents and wellwishers of this college headed by the Principal share their best efforts towards realizing the vision of the founders of this institution.

- The financial support provided to teachers for attending conferences and seminars must be increased.
- College works on first come first served policy admission process and thus loses out academically bright students who approach late for admission. Being an affiliated college we have limited opportunity to maximize the availability of more strength of students.
- Majority of students are from financially weaker sections; with some of them are below poverty line.
- Limited financial resources.
- More functional MOU's may be signed for applications like intership, research etc.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The planning of the academic and co-curricular activities of the college is executed by the IQAC before the initiation of the new academic year. Inputs from all departments are considered at the end of a given academic year for the planning of the next academic year.
- The college offers co-education in the faculties of Humanities, Science, and Commerce at the graduate and post-graduate levels. There are 04 undergraduate and 08 postgraduate programmes.
- The college runs Certificate courses in Herbal Medicine, Sericulture, Office Automation, Communicative English, Tribal Tourism, Certificate Course in Hands-on Training of Basic Chemistry Software, Certificate Course in Dress Designing, and Add-on Course in Vacuum Science and Technology, Human Rights.
- Faculty members contribute to curriculum design at the university level: 05 teachers are members of Board Of Studies ,Gondwana University Gadchiroli; 03 members represent the college in Senate and many members participate in University's paper setting and valuation and moderation work.
- All the UG and PG programmes offer Choice Based Credit System. Elective options are offered in the final year of UG and PG programmes.
- The college ensures that issues relevant to Gender Sensitization, Human values, Environment and sustainability are addressed through curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. UG and PG students participate in Field Visits, Project works.
- Effective feedback mechanism covering all stakeholders has been improvised and made more objective. The mechanism is now digitalized.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- The teaching-learning and evaluation is the core objective behind the existence of any educational institution. Accordingly, the governance of our institution which also includes IQAC puts it into a prime frame. Our institute has unceasingly strived to keep an apex diversification in UG to Ph.D. courses offered. The requisites of each and every facets of the offered curriculum; may it be students' strength or students' diversity or the infrastructure for teaching-learning process has been configured accordingly. As our institute's situatedness poses multiple challenges like the poor and tribal background of students, the customization of the academic transaction has been kept on primacy which includes;
- Remedial for slow and boosters for advance learners. Simultaneously, these challenges are turned into opportunities by appropriate treatments to learners by various initiatives like skill based courses.
- ICT facilitation for seminars, participation in personality grooming activities viz., group discussions, leaderships and representations in significant syndicate like IQAC, student council, etc., Shabdashilp, Sahityayatri, research festivals and many more.
- To enhance the experience of academic transactions, initiatives like flip teaching, group discussion, student seminars, field visits and project works are executed on a substantial scale. At the same time the teaching faculty of our institution has consistently endeavoured for higher ICT implications in academic transactions.
- Apart from usual ICT usage in classrooms, the faculty has also mastered the online teaching-learning

process through various virtual platforms; prominent among them is ZOOM meeting app.

- A gigantic collection of e-content developed within our institution by the respective teachers is circulated by various means viz., Whats App groups, website, etc.
- The library has also collaborated and subscribed with multiple e-platforms like N-List, DELNET, etc. to provide the access to the students in the world of e-resources.
- The uplifting and enrichment of the faculty to enhance the impact on teaching-learning is one of our institute's prime objectives. The time tested teachers and the higher number of Ph.D. qualified teachers somehow inculcate an optimism in the academics of our institution. To receipt the cumulative efforts of teachers and students the internal evaluation is duly managed and a higher grade of transparency is maintained through a systematic mechanism.
- The less number of internal evaluation grievances somehow represents the robust nature of the internal evaluations, but in case the issue arises, it is dealt with an utmost sincerity through a specially appointed committee with an assurance of relief.
- The reflectivity of well drafted and communicated course outcomes by faculties are regularly monitored through various components like theory, practical and perception point of view and various means like unit tests, practical examinations, seminars, group discussion, etc. Eventually, the justification of our existence should reflect in an individual student is our motivation.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- **03** Research projects are sanctioned out of which 02 are funded by UGC and 01 is funded by Forest Department, Govt. of Maharashtra in the last four years. One research project is completed and 02 are ongoing.
- The college organized **30** International/ National/State level seminar/conferences/ workshops.
- **11** of the college faculties are recognized as Ph. D. supervisor. The faculties have published **109** research papers in national/international journals of repute and about **31** full length papers are published in conference proceedings. Staff members have contributed to **21 books** as authors or through edited chapters.
- The college regularly conducts interaction and outreach activities for women empowerment, gender sensitization, health, road safety and environment awareness are undertaken in neighbouring communities to sensitize students regarding the current, burning social issues thereby ensuring the overall development of the students as nation builder.
- Various programmes, camps and rallies under *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Unnat Bharat Abhiyan*, Road Safety Drive, Covid-19 awareness, Blood donation camps, Cleanliness drives, AIDS awareness, voter's awareness, tree plantation drives, leprosy eradication, health check-ups, anti-superstition awareness, gender sensitization programmes, national integration, disaster management workshops, environmental and social surveys are conducted through NSS and other committies. All these activities are executed with active involvement and participation of faculty members and students.
- The college has collected relief fund of Rs. 36,000/- for flood affected people at Sangali and Kolhapur districts and collected Rs. 1,12,248.00 for COVID - 19 relief fund and donated to Chief Minister Relief Fund. Also, collected fund of Rs. 20,400.00 and distribute grain to the needy people.
- The college has received about **12** awards and recognitions for conducting extension activities from Government / Government recognised bodies during last five years.
- The college has signed **09** functional MoU's and has collaborations with academic institutes, government agencies and NGOs for field trips, on-the-job training, resource exchanges, etc.
- Adhering to the mission of the institution "Commitment to Community" the college is engaged in frequent social and economical surveys.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is located in the rural and tribal region having lap of beautiful nature with spacious Green campus spread over. The total built up area is 3.68 Acres.

- The College has 25 well-furnished Classrooms and 3 seminar halls which are adequately ventilated having all essential facilities, most of them have ICT facilities. Entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled having internet speed more than 50 Mbps.
- Science departments have total 17 well equipped and separate laboratories for each department. Recognized Ph.D. center (IHLRSS) of university in Zoology, Mathematics, Marathi, Sociology and History.
- The college Library is subscribed with e-learning resources, INFLIBNET N-List, Delnet, National and International journals and periodicals and M-OPAC Facility having upgraded (ILMS) cloud-based Mastersoft ERP software.
- The College has 02 computer laboratories. 101 computers for students use.
- Media Centre: The college have media center facility to record lectures and events of college which have various digital equipments like Handy cam, digital projector, portable ampli-speaker system, Headphone, computer with software, digital camera, collar and cordless mikes.
- Classrooms and seminar hall are enabled with 04 Digital K-yan Smart interactive touch screen projectors and 10 LCD projectors, and 03 Visualizers for effective teaching learning.
- On Rooftop of main building solar panel was installed which generate 35000 kW/hr electricity.
- Generator is installed for emergency electricity in auditorium and seminar hall.
- As the region is Tribal and Naxal affected, Girls' hostel facility is also available to encourage students.
- Herbal Garden: College campus has herbal garden which contains many medicinal plants species which distinctly found in the biodiversity of Gadchiroli district.
- College has indoor stadium having modern facility for indoor games like Table Tennis, Badminton, Kabaddi. Outdoor open ground for basketball, Kho-Kho Volleyball, Cricket, dedicated space for yoga and Gymnasium having all modern facilities.
- The college has its own auditorium. Every year the college organizes Yuvarang annual cultural and sports meet to exhibit students inherent talents.
- College makes budgetary provision under plan of the Principal, College development committee, IQAC and infrastructure committee for optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of physical, academic and support facilities. For the optimum working condition and maintenance services of all the equipments on the campus annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) have been prepared with different vendors.

Student Support and Progression

- The Institution has a well-established student-support system for financial assistance, Skill enhancement and development, student progression and alumni engagement.
- The institute welcomes all government scholarships as well as non-government scholarships i.e. (HPCL under CSR Scheme). Offers concession for admission in B.Sc.Home-Science. Academic Excellence Award from staff to the meritorious students to encourage their academic achievements.
- The institution takes strong initiative to organize Skill Enhancement and development programmes throughout the year which result in students holistic development.
- The institution organizes workshops, guidance on career counselling and competitive examination.

Spardhartna competitive examination. The Institution provides library, e-journals, INFLIBNET, newspapers, magazines, competitive examination books.

- College promotes students to extend further education.
- In the last five years 22 students have qualified NET/SET/GATE examination and 3 students have qualified competitive examinations.
- In last five years 31 students received awards and medals in Institution/University level Sport tournaments. Apart from this 42 students are colour holders and who represent Gondwana University Gadchiroli in National/State level sports and cultural competitions.
- Organizational, leadership and literary skills of students are polished through the conduct of numerous co-curricular and extra-curricular activities including “Yuvarang- Cultural and Sports Meet”, NSS camps and college annual magazine “SHABDSHILP”.
- The students Council is constituted as per the rules and regulations laid down by the university.
- Under Charity Act Commission the Institution has registered Alumni Association as “Mahatma Gandhi Mahavidyalaya Alumni Association Armori ” with 1,73,127.30 Rs. alumni contribution.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- In consideration with the distant perspectives, the vision and mission were drafted and are in accordance with the situatedness of our institution. The synchronization of the governance with the actions expected for the achievement of the vision and mission is our prime characteristics.
- The existence of decentralization in our every proceeding makes us a center of advance in all respect. The prime syndicates of our institution including CDC, IQAC, Academic Council, etc. chalks out perspective plan and ensure effective deployment. Some well known examples are the center of higher learning in Zoology, virtual teaching-learning, etc.
- The governance of our institution is duly regulated with well-designed policies either drafted by the affiliating agencies or by the syndicate of our institution and has been fully transformed to e-version to keep it effective and efficient with respect to all sort of transactions.
- A healthy work environment is achieved by supporting the staff through nearly 10-15 welfare schemes and financial supports for their academic progression. The consistent motivation to faculty for their caliber enhancement is a common practice and can be seen in the various development programs faculty underwent either within or out of the institution.
- The staff is motivated and analyzed for their promotions with well drafted procedures. Our institute unceasingly strives for external financial supports and fruits of which have been tasted by our students too; best example is the HPCL scholarship received consistently for two years.
- The institution makes sure about the optimal utilization of the funds raised or received through the proceedings of College Development Committee at the same time audits are done and sanctioned in the same. Eventually, the IQAC of our institution plays an articulating agency at multilevel strategies including teaching-learning, utilization of e-platforms, promotions of staff, key role player in all sort of strategic activities, etc.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- Promotion of Gender Equity which results into an institution of choice for girls students. The college caters to the safety and security of girls.
- CCTV cameras are installed for the safety and security of students. Complaint/suggestion box is kept on the campus. Anti-raging committee, sexual harassment committee and grievance redressed committees

are formed to resolve college students issues.

- Organization of a variety of awareness programmes and special talks i.e. fit India, self-defence training programme, *Mahila-raj* (self-governance by girls students). Various workshops for sensitizing girls students about their health, personal issues aiming towards their empowerment.
- Installation of the green solar PV roof top power plant which is connected to the power grid of MSEDCL.
- The biodegradable waste from college campus is converted into vermicompost, an activity run by Zoology Department. Roof top water harvesting and surface run off water harvesting on the campus. Green campus with restricted entry for automobiles, pedestrian friendly pathway and plastic free campus. Landscaping of trees and plants is performed, plants are provided QR codes. Tree plantation and conservation in and outside campus are our green initiatives. As a part of environment conservation green audit and energy audit are done on regular basis.
- The Divyangjan friendly, barrier free environment providing safety to the differently abled students.
- Continuous efforts of the institution in providing inclusive environment and harmony towards cultural, regional, linguistic, communal, socio-economic and other diversities.
- Certificate course in Human Rights is run by the Political Science Department. Observance of the birth and death of anniversaries of great leaders. Celebration of value-based programmes like Constitution Day, Good Governance Day, Voter Awareness programmes etc.
- Students' induction programme is organised to welcome the newly admitted students. Code of conduct is displayed on college website and on the campus.
- To aware the students, staff and society, College Road Safety Committee organise a range of road safety activities like workshops, road safety street play, motor cycle rally, road safety oath, potholes repair etc. The college adopted **Road Safety Mission** and **Women Empowerment** as Best Practices. Effective implementation of U.B.A. (Unnat Bharat Abhiyan) and full involvement of students and staff in this community-based activity.
- Peoples' Biodiversity Register is our institutional distinctiveness. Environment conservation and preservation through the Peoples Biodiversity Register, a distinctive activity of institution to preserve the knowledge of local people regarding nearby flora and fauna. Students and staff make regular visits to the adopted villages and on the basis of their field projects Peoples' Biodiversity Register is prepared annually.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

- **Curricular Planning:**

Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science, and Late N. P. Commerce College, Armori is affiliated with Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, and the institution's all programmes follow the university's curriculum. Before the opening of each academic year, the institution's IQAC prepares a consolidated academic calendar that takes into account academic terms, teaching days, major events at the university and college level, tentative examination schedules, etc. It can be accessed on the institution's website. Every academic year, the faculty members are briefed on the institution's academic activities at the first meeting of the academic year. Every department sets its departmental academic calendar based on the institutional academic calendar. A separate time-table for Arts, Commerce, and Science faculties is created with the permission of the Principal taking into account the workload allotted to each faculty.

- **Implimentation:**

The curriculum is planned and implemented through departmental meetings. Various aspects of planning include preparation of teaching plans, departmental schedule of lectures, workload distribution, remedial coaching, methods of teaching, internal evaluation, tutorials, practicals, study tours, guest lectures, departmental events, MoU and linkages for faculty, e-content development, result-analysis, etc. Departments plan their short-term certificate courses as per the needs of the students. Co-curricular activities are organized for strengthening the learning process. Programme and course-related syllabus, POs, PSOs, and COs are uploaded on the college website

Faculty members design a teaching plan for theory and practicals at the beginning of each session. The teaching plans and syllabus completion reports are submitted to IQAC for record-keeping. A daily academic diary is maintained by each teacher which contains information about the timetable, a daily teaching summary, and information about academic and administrative responsibilities etc. A committee appointed by the principal monitors and signs the academic diary regularly and at the end of every academic session it is submitted to the IQAC. Staff meetings are held regularly to keep track of the curriculum. Departments combine classroom teaching with various ICT tools, practicals, unit tests, field projects, students' seminars, tutorials, home assignments, projects, etc. to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum. The institute hosts seminars, conferences, and workshops for teachers as part of its attempts to improve subject knowledge.

The institution also offers remedial coaching to slow learners. It also provides a mentorship programme for academic problems. In addition to providing subject-specific books, Journals and e-Journals; the institution's central library offers a reading room, Book Bank, and other services too. Teachers and students have access to Wi-Fi. Teachers provide students with study material to help them prepare for exams. The

institution conducts the Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) by the external committee for improvement in the academic and administrative activities.

- **Feedback Process:**

feedback on the curriculum is obtained from students, teachers, alumni and employers at the end of each academic year. The feedback report is used in next year for better curriculum delivery.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science, and Late N. P. Commerce College, Armori is affiliated with Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, and hence follows the university's academic calendar. The institution's IQAC serves a critical role in maintaining the academic calendar for the conduct of continuous internal evaluation of the students. IQAC develops the consolidated academic calendar at the beginning of each academic year, taking into account academic terms proclaimed by the university. It is also available to all stakeholders on the website.

For all activities taking place throughout the academic year, the institution follows the academic calendar. The academic calendar specifies the teaching-learning schedule, the number of teaching days in each semester, university and institution examination schedules, mandatory continuous internal evaluation such as unit tests, seminars, and project work for all departments, as well as major co-curricular, extra-curricular, and extension activities at the college. The academic calendar also incorporates national/state/regional or other holidays, camps, excursions, and educational tours, field visits, parents-teachers meets, alumni meet, birth and death anniversary of founder president, the annual gathering, the inauguration of various subject societies, guest lectures, etc. Minor adjustments to the academic calendar can only be made by the institution's Principal and IQAC. Based on the suggested academic calendar, the teaching plan is built around the number of working days available in each semester. It is rarely a challenge to stick to the academic calendar.

For the better employment of CIE, the concerned teachers of all departments conduct unit tests after the end of each unit. In addition to the CIE-mandated unit tests, seminars, and project work, each department designs and implements internal evaluation activities such as group discussions, seminars, extra unit tests, oral tests, field projects, and so on. For the conduct of CIE, each department follows the academic calendar. The institution's Principal holds staff council meetings regularly to ensure that academic and examination-based activities operate properly.

Throughout the academic session, the head of the institution oversees teaching, learning, and assessment as a continuous process in the institution. Students in semesters V and VI are assigned projects as part of the skill enhancement course, as well as a home assignment before the conclusion of the semester as part of the internal assessment at the end of each semester. Most of the teachers in the practical-based subjects are the internal examiners in the practical examination conducted by the university. Therefore, they follow strictly the teaching plan and time-bound delivery of the curriculum to the students and conduct Continuous Internal Evaluation of the students without fail.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The institution offers various UG and PG courses in the Arts, Science, and Commerce faculties. The curriculum directly or indirectly incorporates professional ethics, gender equity, human values, the environment, and sustainability.

Gender equality, environment and sustainability, and human values are all discussed in English and Marathi language courses. Social Science courses such as Sociology, Political Science and History connect Human values and Gender awareness. The courses like Commerce and Economics are integrated with Professional Ethics. Geography is designed to help students become more aware of the environment and sustainability issues. Many courses in natural science departments, such as Botany, Zoology, and Chemistry, focus on the environment and sustainability.

A myriad of cross-cutting issues can be addressed through the institution's cocurricular and extracurricular activities. For the development of human values and professional ethics, the NSS and other committees organize events such as national heroes' anniversaries, Yoga Day, Blood Donation Camps, Road Safety Campaign, Programmes related to Voting Rights, a clean-up drive, a tree-planting drive, etc. As part of the institute, there is a botanical garden that protects rare herbal plants. Aside from collecting and replanting rare and endangered plants, the Botany department also discusses and practices many other important environmental issues.

No distinction is made between male and female students in the institution; instead, they are encouraged to take part in all kinds of extra-curricular and co-curricular activities such as the Annual Social Gathering, the NSS, sports, and university-level cultural programme such as 'Indradhanushya'. There is a great deal of excitement among the students to participate in the special annual NSS camp that is held in the adopted village.

Every year, the institution honours Mahatma Gandhi's vision of universal peace and harmony by commemorating "Gandhi Jayanti". the Institution's 'Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Centre' honors prominent social workers with 'Mahatma Gandhi Manav Seva Award' for their contributions to society. Some well-known orators are being invited to spread the message of human values such as fraternity, equality, religious morals, etc. Through guest lectures from distinguished speakers, the institution organizes the birth anniversary of Shivaji Maharaj. Every year, 'Vaachan Prerna Din' is celebrated in the institution to remind students of the importance of books in their lives.

The Taluka Magistrate, PSI, Geologist, and others are among those who have been invited to guide the

students. The institute holds programmes focused at women's social health and empowerment on a regular basis. The college also celebrates International Women's Day. Tree planting and plant species preservation are among the institutional programmes for environmental awareness, as are Ozone Layer Conservation Day, World Wetland Day, village cleaning campaigns, and plastic-free drives. The institution's "No Vehicle Day," which occurs once a month, is a monthly event. Several measures have been taken to address solid, liquid, and chemical waste management. LED bulbs have been fitted to save energy and minimise pollution, and solar panels on the roof create 35,000 kWh per year. Green audits are carried out by different departments.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Introduction: The principal behind assessing the learning levels of the students is “*the right diagnosis consequences absolute cure*”. To make the process organized and effective, especially in consideration to rural and tribal students, the IQAC has appointed a special committee to draft the guideline for the implementation of the programmes for slow and advance learners. On through discussion over the draft named as *Academic Sustenance System (ASS)*, it was finalized and implemented. The learning levels of the students after the entry in the institution are evaluated comprehensively by the preapproved methods of the ASS. Accordingly, the learners are subjected to different academic environments to achieve the prescribed objectives.

Objectives:

1. To assess the learning level of students.
2. To provide academic supplements to students in accordance to their learning levels.
3. To carve a systematic academic support system to satisfy the students’ diversity.

Execution:

Following are the techniques used for the assessment of the learning levels of the students.

1. **Formative assessment performance (Classroom interaction, unit test, extempore, etc.):** The identification of the new comer learners’ level is achieved by their respective performances in the formative assessments like feedbacks while classroom interaction, unit test results, extempore activities, etc.
2. **Summative assessment performance (University results):** The university results are used as a source to sort the slow and advance learners, who have at least attempted one university examination of the admitted course.

Once the learners’ level is identified, following programs were designed to provide a support system to them.

1. **Remedial coaching:** The classified slow learners are subjected to the remedial coaching, which is a supplementary but indispensable system, committed to enhance the slow learners’ academic calibre and confidence for better results. The sorted slow learners are called for an interaction and detailed discussions are made to chalk out the remediation policy. Following are the initiatives taken;
 1. Engagement in traditional remedial sessions.
 2. Simple mentoring on specifically raised issues by learners during the interactions.
 3. Remediation on classroom inputs regarding hard topics, quires, etc.
 4. Providing the old paper sets for practise.

1. **Boosters:** This drive is specifically meant for the advance learners and is motivated to encourage them for achieving academic pace higher than the existing one. The faculty conducts special interaction sessions to know about learners' needs and expectations. Accordingly following inputs are given;

1. Exceptional learning materials & e-contents are provided.
2. Special mentoring during booster sessions is done.
3. Continuous monitoring of their progress is kept to maintain the pace.
4. Involvement in participative type of learning like student seminars, group discussions, and project based learning.

Apart from the remedial and boosters, the programs like guest lectures, filed exposures, participations in extra-curricular and extension activities are organized for all sort of learners.

Outcomes:

Many of the learners have improved the academic pace and comparatively came out to be successful. Some of the university merits were bagged from advance learners and rest has improved their academic jumps for higher studies.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Introduction:

The challenges for the students in academic and forthcoming professional life are continuously augmenting. In consideration to the enhancements of the rural and tribal students' in terms of academic and professional performances, the IQAC has appointed special committee to select some of the feasible

but effective student centric methods for augmenting their learning experiences. On comprehensive dialogue over the report by the IQAC members and the selected stakeholders, the report was made generalized for execution. The lubrication and flexibility is assured to the faculty for selecting the methods of their choice. The ultimate objective behind instigating student centric learning system are as follows;

Objectives:

1. To enhance the impact of teaching.
2. To amplify the learning experience of the learners.
3. To develop an effectual mechanism for the teacher-student academic interaction.

Selected Techniques:

Following are the techniques used for the student centric learning system.

1. **Group discussion method:** In this method the teacher plans a systematic sessions of group discussion (GD) along with the pre-classified group of students. First the teacher groups the students for GD and then particularized them with their respective topic. Here, a group is liberal to choose or amend the topic of discussion. Second the GD is executed in pre-scheduled duration, after which a brief summarisation is done by respective teacher. All students are given an equal opportunity to participate.
2. **Flip Method:** Here the role of the teacher and students is flipped for teaching. The teacher first assigns the topics to few selected students, especially with the interest to do so and provides personalized teaching to them. The flipped session is scheduled, hosted and monitored by the teacher. At the end, the teacher is responsible to brief the flipped session.
3. **Student Seminars:** A list of topics is allotted to the students and they are motivated to present the seminar accordingly. A due freedom of topic selection is also maintained for the students. The teacher mentors the respective students on the topic and the presentation skills, especially on ICT usage.
4. **Project based method:** This is a participative cum experiential type of learning where students are engaged in a purposeful task related to curriculum. The teacher provides a situation related to the curriculum with a justified purpose to the students. The designing and execution is completely done by the students, but under the guidance of the teachers. All such projects are evaluated by the teacher and external (if needed) and drafted accordingly.
5. **Miscellaneous:** The participation of students in collegiate/inter-collegiate/intra-university events like science exhibition, elocution competition, field visit, Peoples' Biodiversity Register, etc. are confirmed to provide them a varsity of learning experience. The students are also motivated to express their views in form poems, articles, thoughts as a published document named as *Shabdashilp* and as a wall magazine named *Sahitya Yatri*.

Outcomes:

The enhancement of students' understanding related to the subject was observed. The augmented presentation skills were achieved by many students. Many of the students bagged awards at various levels.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

Introduction:

The impending influence of the information and communication technology (ICT) over the teaching-learning processes has made its usage as obligation and our institute is no exception. To catch the accelerating pace of the ICT usage, the institute has set a special committee fully dedicated for the ICT resource development and its usage for usual teaching-learning. Being an institute with majority of rural and tribal enrolments, special measures are taken to overcome the hurdles.

Methodology employed:

The committee has motivated the faculty for the creations of the new e-contents in form of PowerPoint presentations, YouTube videos, online MCQs, etc. in the media centre and simultaneously monitored the entire process of appropriate usage in teaching-learning. As a consequence following activities are done for the effective usage of ICT;

1. The faculty is frequently using the PowerPoint presentations while usual teaching-learning in the classrooms equipped with LCD projectors.
2. The faculty is also employing the online platform like ZOOM meeting app, Google classroom, etc. extensively for innovative and effective curriculum delivery.
3. Along with the traditional methods of evaluations, the faculty is also using the online platforms like Google form, testmoz, etc. for the formative evaluation of the students.
4. In the COVID-19 pandemic, the full curriculum was delivered on the online platforms, especially on ZOOM by every faculty and the formative and summative evaluations were also done through online mode.
5. To provide an ease in communication with the students, the What's App groups were created by every faculty for their respective students. The all sort of notices, announcements, e-content are being shared through these groups.
6. The e-contents developed by the faculty are regularly updated and rotated on the institutional website for open access to all students.
7. The majority of the faculty has created a YouTube channel with their respective uploaded teaching videos and are circulated through the What's App groups and institutional website.
8. Many of the national and international e-seminar/e-conferences/e-workshops are being organized entirely on the online mode, especially through ZOOM platform to sustain the academic ambience among students in COVID-19 pandemic.
9. The students are motivated to participate in the SWAYAM affiliated courses and faculty to participate in the ICT based trainings.
10. The library has subscribed the INFLIBNET (N-List) and made a large e-resource available for both faculty and students. The library has also made MoU with the Dell-NET for the mutual sharing of e-

resources.

11. Apart from above, the institute have a special committee dedicated to institutional social media, organizing Facebook, Twitter and YouTube handles of the institute.

Outcomes:

The utilization of ICT tools at various levels and in differential forms has proved to be laxative in the delivery and assimilation of the curriculum among the students. The students became skilled enough to deal with the various online platforms used in the academia. The ICT has facilitated the convection of the knowledge and information between the institute and the students, especially in the COVID-19 pandemic.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The institution is taking many vital initiatives to robust the internal evaluation practices and to keep a transparency within it. To achieve the anticipated academic outcomes the IQAC has suggested the constitution of various committees at institutional level. Following committees were dedicated for the execution and monitoring of internal examinations;

Result Improvement Committee (2016-17 and 2018-19), Board of Academic Council (2018-19 and 2019-20) and Academic Activities Planning and Monitoring Committee (2020-21 and 2021-22): A continuous internal evaluation mechanism has been developed at the institutional level by inculcating internal examinations in the academic calendar. All departments were called for their schedule regarding the execution of the internal assessment in synchronization to the academic calendar. Throughout the session, monitoring of schedule and records keeping of each and every department has been done. The mechanism continuously strived to develop innovative internal evaluation process with due discussions with all faculties and the students. Following are the committee specific functionings;

1. **Result Analysis and Internal Examination** – This committee monitored and analysed the university results right from first year of undergraduate to final year of postgraduate. The committee identifies various lacunas on the basis of results and suggested the respective efforts, the faculties needed in teaching-learning processes. This committee has also controlled the internal examinations of the institution which includes unit test, oral tests, home assignment, seminars, projects, practical, etc. so that a smooth and fare process of evaluation should thrive.
2. **Curriculum Vigilance and examination:** This committee monitored and resolved all the issues related to curriculum execution and respective examinations (especially practical). Timely feedbacks from the students and faculties are taken to synchronize the faculty-student interactions and resolved the lacuna (if any).
3. **Feedback Analysis Committee** – The committee sincerely gathers feedback from the students regarding the robustness and transparency of the internal examinations conducted by the institution. The responses are also made available in the public domain and simultaneously discussed for improvements.

Overall execution:

1. An academic calendar drafted by the IQAC includes the internal assessments schedule too.
2. Each and every department executes internal examinations prescribed by the Gondwana University in accordance with the academic calendar.
3. The respective departments pre-intimate the schedule of internal assessments to students through offline and online notices.
4. The procedures adopted for the various internal assessment parameters like unit test, seminars, practical, etc. are kept transparent and student friendly.
5. The results of the internal assessments are discussed with the respective students for enhancing performance.
6. The scores of every individual student are sent to the university with due precision to make it included in final score sheet.

Role of the IQAC:

1. The drafting of an academic calendar.
2. The constituting agency of various committees for internal evaluations.
3. Continuous monitoring the internal assessments by inspecting the co-curricular dairies of the teaching staff.

Outcomes:

The internal assessment system has been developed as decentralized mechanism with utmost transparency and efficiency. The least number of grievances in concern to internal assessments and students satisfaction in feedback is the token of robustness.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

The grievances in concern to internal examinations are always prioritized and a special mechanism has been formulated to deal the same.

Departmental Mechanism:

All internal examinations including unit test, oral tests, assignments, seminar, practical, etc. are conducted at departmental level by the respective faculty under the supervision of the Head of the department. The respective results (except the confidential) are shared among students to analyse their performances. In case of any issue or grievance, the students are advised to discuss with the respective faculty for redressal. If the satisfaction is not achieved, the students are advised to put the grievance to the especially dedicated committee constituted at the institutional level.

Institutional Mechanism:

The institute has constituted following committees to keep the redressal transparent, time-bound and efficient. Every time the committee has been chaired by the Principal of the institute;

1. The **Grievance and Redressal cell** was effective during 2017-18 session and
2. The **Student Grievance Cell** came into force from 2018-19 onwards.

Execution:

1. The constituted committees' information has been circulated among the students through various channels.
2. The committees have also been displayed on the institutional website too (<http://www.mgcollegearmori.ac.in/Grievances.aspx>).
3. The students were informed to put their respective grievances regarding internal examinations to the committee.
4. Once the grievances are put from the student's part, the committee analyses the same with due caution.
5. The committee communicates the issues with the concerning faculty or the department and directs to resolve the same at its earliest in accordance with the suggestion made.
6. The respective students are informed regarding the action taken on behalf of their grievances and recorded the feedback accordingly.
7. Looking into the hurdles of COVID-19 pandemic, an online mode of grievance redressal has been developed. The students can register their grievances through the link (<https://forms.gle/RXCUrJEdMmvUmcN69>) given on the institutional website. The rest of the mechanism is same but executed through online tools.

University level Grievances:

Apart from the issues resolvable at institutional level, the issues subjected to the university regarding the internal marks, practical scores, seminar scores, etc. are also resolved by communicating the same to the university authority.

Outcomes:

Most of the students have resolved the issues at the departmental level with much ease. Few internal examination grievances subjected to the institutional committee are resolved on urgent basis.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

The outcomes of any activity are the most anticipated ones. The Gondwana university, being an affiliating university to our institution, drafts and amends the syllabus of all the programs offered by us. The institution has taken initiative in drafting the programs outcomes and course outcomes of the respective curriculum. The institute also has developed a mechanism for communicating the same among the students and other stakeholders.

Drafting Mechanism:

The IQAC has taken initiative in the preparation of the various program outcomes and course outcomes of the curriculum in collaboration with the respective departments. Following was the mechanism of drafting the program outcomes and course outcomes;

1. The IQAC first informed all the departmental heads and subordinates to go through the syllabus of their respective subjects keeping the view to deduce specific course outcomes out of it.
2. Once the departments deduced the respective course outcomes, the IQAC along with the faculty heads drafted the program outcomes in synchronization with each and every course outcome.
3. After a comprehensive discussion, the program outcomes and course outcomes were finalized for communicating with the respective beneficiaries.

Communicating Mechanism:

The drafted program outcomes and course outcomes are meant for the students and the stakeholders of the institute and hence are communicated with a due responsibility. Following mechanism has been adopted for the same;

1. The program outcomes and course outcomes kept in public domain through institutional website (http://www.mgcollegearmori.ac.in/files/POs_PSOs_COs_.pdf).
2. Each and every faculty has made course files including respective syllabus with outcomes.
3. The very first lecture of every class has been initiated by the delivery of the respective program outcomes and course outcomes.
4. A comprehensive discussion with students over the program outcomes and course outcomes has been expected.
5. Each and every faculty has created the YouTube teaching video over their respective course outcomes.
6. The YouTube videos are also made available on the institutional website for common access.

Outcomes:

The teacher, students and other stakeholders are well aware of the program outcomes and course outcomes. This awareness at very first instance has given a generous opportunity to students for selecting the respective program of their compatibility. The various course outcomes lubricate the curriculum delivery and suffice the teaching-learning objectives.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The attainment of the program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are of priority concern for the institute. The IQAC has chalked out the strategy to evaluate the attainments by substantial churning with heads of respective departments. The attainments are classified into various components to keep them as anticipated qualities after the attainments of the program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes. The respective parameters are also chosen to evaluate the attainments.

Components of Attainment:

The attainments were classified on the basis of the cumulative nature of the program outcomes and course outcomes. Following are the components;

1. Subject's theoretical knowledge
2. Subject's practical knowledge
3. Subject's perception

Parameters for Evaluation:

Following parameters were chosen to evaluate the respective attainments;

1. **Unit test, Surprise tests, Home assignment and University theory results:** These parameter are used to evaluate the theoretical knowledge of the subject. The unit test, surprise tests, home assignment are the part of the internal assessment system and its continuous execution is assured. The university examinations are also an effective way to evaluate the attainments. The students' performance in them signified the attainment magnitude.
2. **Practical examinations and Field studies:** These parameters are used to evaluate the practical knowledge of the subject. The performances in the practical examinations elucidated the attainment of the practical component of the subject. The field studies and projects are other parameters used to evaluate the practical knowledge of the subject. These parameters may or may not be applicable to all. The subjects with practical and field oriented curriculum are more precisely evaluated through these parameters.
3. **Oral tests, Seminar and Group discussion:** These parameters are used to evaluate the perception of the subject. The institute has continuously engaged the students in participative learning methods like seminar and group discussion. The students' understanding about the subject is reflected in the presentations made in the activities like oral tests, seminars and group discussions.

On behalf of the above parameters, the attainments of the program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated. The respective evaluation done has been discussed between the IQAC and the respective departments through various means like result analysis and internal examination committee, curriculum vigilance and examination committee, feedback committee, etc.

Outcomes:

The attainments are evaluated with due precision and respective lacunas are resolved accordingly. The theoretical and practical knowledge of the students has been seen to be enhanced and the reflections are achieved in form of their progression to higher studies.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

The institution has created an innovation ecosystem that includes dynamic activities for organising, generating, collecting, and transmitting data. The following are the most significant initiatives:

Identification, collection, cultivation, and knowledge transmission of therapeutic, rare, and near-extinction plants

The Department of Botany conducts a wild medicinal plant diversity study in order to gather information on medicinal plants found in rural and tribal areas to protect their vital bio-resources. The Department has established a herbal (medicinal) botanical garden on the college campus, which is home to 48 medicinal, unusual, and endangered plant species, as well as a herbarium sheet with over 250 species are available. A Certificate Course in Herbal Medicine is run by the department to pass on local traditional knowledge, uses and importance of plants to the students. Students make herbal products (*Satavari Kalpa*, *Adulsa Kalpa*) in the lab using plants from the garden. Apart from this, scientific information of the plant species is transferred through an innovative approach by creating QR Code for each plant.

The college received an award from District Magistrate for environmental conservation through this innovative activity.

Innovative Social Survey Projects

Several arts faculty departments conduct surveys on rural people, their poverty, sanitation, illiteracy, crime, unemployment, addictions, and lack of awareness for health and hygiene. The collected information can be used to plan solutions to the problems indicated in the survey. The Geography Department conducted research on poultry farming and other related issues in Kasvi Village. A noteworthy observation was that only 35% of people were interested in chicken poultry as a side business while 65% were not interested.

The English dept. conducted Orientation class for improving primary students' English knowledge. The Marathi department conducted surveys on dialects spoken in nearby villages and folk songs. Department of Economics conducted surveys on village farmers' income sources and recommended establishment of food processing industries in the area such as dairy and poultry farming.

The Home Economics Department conducted Diet Survey to improve the health of the villagers and prevent malnutrition in children and women. The Department of Political Science conducted survey on Gram panchayat and Gramsabha and provided suggestions for village development. These social survey projects include innovative topics that study, and suggest solutions to the problems of society.

Innovative Dissemination of Knowledge and Research

The R&D Committee consistently conducts various activities to boost the research and innovation environment. We have 5 Ph.D. Research centres and 13 recognised research supervisors. At present, 24 Ph.D. students are pursuing research on applied, latest and innovative topics such as thermoelastic problems on different solids, and hydroscopic effects on nanocomposite objects. The findings are published in reputable journals and thesis are submitted to universities.

Research exhibition 'Knowledge Expo' is organized annually where students exhibit their research talent through models and projects. Faculties and students are encouraged to participate in 'Avishkar' where they are awarded many times. Minor and Major Research projects have been conducted and published. Seminars/conferences on IPR, Latest Research, etc. were organized to promote quality research. Library has DELNET Subscription.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The college has organized various activities to fulfil its vision and mission which in turn sensitise students to social issues and looked after the holistic development of the students by inculcating social responsibility, accountability, leadership. Some of the major activities are:

Adopted villages and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan: The college has adopted five villages under *Unnat Bharat Abhiyan* viz. *Asta, Kasvi, Palora, Antarji and Rampur* for resolving issues and sensitizing students about it. The activities Administration at your doorstep, NSS camp, socio-economic survey, *Gram Sabha*, Revenue department camp, health check-up and Vaccination of Domestic Animals camp, Women and child health check-up camp, Financial awareness camp, cleanliness drive, construction of *Kacha Dam*, social awareness are organized.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The college is located in the rural and tribal region having lap of beautiful nature with spacious Green campus spread over an area of 14892.43 sq.meter (3.68 acres) with a built up area of 9448.33 Sq. meter which offers pleasurable ambiance. The institution is running UG in Science, Arts and Commerce while PG in Arts and Science. There are in total 20 departments. The entire campus infrastructure includes administrative block, three separate buildings of Arts, Science and Commerce. The institution is based on spiritual thoughts of Mahatma Gandhi, Rashtasant Tukdoji Maharaj, Founder president Late Wamanraoji Wanmali and their inspirational statues are installed on the campus.

- **Classrooms:** The College has 26 well-furnished Classrooms and 3 seminar halls which are adequately ventilated having all essential facilities, most of them have ICT facilities.
- **Laboratories:** The laboratories are scientifically planned having ventilation, big open windows, modern safety equipment's and exposed to natural sunlight. Science departments have total 17 well equipped and separate laboratories for each department of UG, PG which include Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Geology, Computer science, Geography, Home Science, Home Economics, and Music to carry out practicals and research in respective subjects.
- **Research facility:** Recognized Ph.D. Center (IHLRSS) of university in Zoology, Mathematics, Marathi, Sociology and History.
- **Library:** The college has a Central Library which is subscribed with e-learning resources, INFLIBNET N-List, Delnet, National and International journals and periodicals and M-OPAC Facility. Library stocks large number of books and upgraded cloud-based MasterSoft ERP software for library use and barcode for accession of the books. The library has its own reading room for students and staff. The library possesses library network resource center where students can e-access study and research material.
- **Computer Facility:** - The College has updated 02 computer laboratories and one Knowledge Resource Center in library having all 101 computers for students use only.
- **ICT facilities:** Classrooms and seminar halls are enabled with 04 Digital K-yan Smart interactive touch screen projectors and 10 LCD projectors, and 03 Visualizers for effective teaching learning. Entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled and CCTV cameras are installed for safety measures.
- **Media Centre:** The college has media center facility to record lecture and events of college which has various digital equipment's like Handy Camera, digital Projector, portable Ampli-speaker system, Headphone, Computer with recording software, Digital Camera, Collar and Cordless Mike.
- **Herbal Garden:** College campus has herbal Botanical garden which contains many medicinal plant species which distinctly found in the biodiversity of Gadchiroli district.
- **Auditorium:** The college has its own auditorium for cultural and sports activities, which is equipped with digital audiovisual system.
- **Solar Panel:** On Rooftop of main building solar panel is installed which generate 35000 kW/hr electricity which accomplish requisite of college and remaining electricity will send it to MECB.
- **Hostel Facility:** As the region is tribal and Naxals affected Girls' hostel facility is also available to

encourage girl's students.

- **Generator:** Generator is installed for emergency electricity in auditorium and seminar hall.
- **Indoor stadium:** College has indoor stadium with all facility required for indoor games.

College makes budgetary provision under plan of the Principal, College Development Committee IQAC and Infrastructure Committee for optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities. College prepare portfolio for every academic session for maintenance of services to stakeholder. Optimum working conditions of all the properties/equipment on the campus are ensured through annual Maintenance Contract (AMC).

- **Laboratory Equipment:** Lab attendant of each department maintains instruments and apparatus under the supervision of head of respective Departments and Computerized stock entries are updated every year. Chemicals are stored as per the standards specified by the suppliers. There is well-organized system for disposal of waste biodegradable chemicals. The calibration, repairing and maintenance of sophisticated lab equipment are done periodically.
- **Classrooms:** The college has active Infrastructure Committee which receive requirements timely from heads of all departments, all stakeholders and improvement on it under the guidance of principal. Smart ICT Enabled classrooms and projectors are provided for purpose of quality education. Maintenance of wooden furniture of Classrooms is done when required with the help of annual maintenance contract with vendor Harish Enterprises Gadchiroli. Classrooms electrical equipment are checked timely and inspired for conservation of electrical energy. To cultivate the habit of cleaning among students many efforts are taken on Classroom and laboratory cleaning by recruiting extra services employed on contract.
- **Library:** - The maintenance of the reading room and stock verification of library books is done regularly by Library Advisor Committee. Librarian collect required purchasing list of reference books and journals from all the departments and present annual Library Budget of session which is discussed with Library Advisor Committee and Principal. College library has installed Master soft ERP Library Management System software which is completely automated and controls all the functions of a library. Every student and faculty have installed M-OPAC mobile application. Footfall entry of students and teachers can be recorded through scanning QR code of library through this mobile App. The appropriate account of visitors (students and staff) on daily basis is maintained. Other issues such as weeding out of old titles schedule of issue/return of books etc. are resolved out by the library committee.
- **Computers, CCTV& UPS:**The ICT smart class rooms, Computers of offices, Departments, computer laboratory are upkeep repaired and software are updated in well-time by Website Maintenance committee by communicating with contracted vendor Shri. Sai Ram Computer Services Armori. For providing fluctuation-free, uninterrupted electric supply, and internet Computer laboratory and Library is connected to a dedicated stabilizers and UPS.
- **Electrical Maintenance:** College has installed roof solar panel which generate 35000 kW/hr fulfill all need of electricity and for the electricity maintenance and services college has done annual maintenance contract with vendor Om SaiRam Electrical Services Armori. Repairing and maintenance of bulb/Fan points, power plug points, AC points, replace the defective switches, plugs and electrical fitting, repair of motor pump set, compound light and operation of Diesel Generator.
- **Sports Facilities:** Sports and Health Club Committee under the leadership of Physical Education Director who plans for optimum utilization of sport facilities. The college has its well organized own sports ground for various sports and fully furnished Indoor stadium that is maintained and enhanced regularly with the help of ground staff and other contracting agencies. Response:

Decentralization Functioning

The decentralization of the administration is a common practice in our institution. The Principal is the administrative head subordinated by Vice-Principal, IQAC coordinator with members, faculty heads, and various committee heads. The Principal and IQAC prepare portfolios assigning different responsibilities to the faculty members. The Principal and IQAC conduct meetings with heads of the portfolio department to chalk out action plans of curricular, extra-curricular, and extension activities to be conducted throughout the year. Each committee has a head who looks after its functioning throughout the year. The head is provided with operational autonomy to plan activities and distribute work among committee members.

Decentralization of Academics

Apart from the portfolio, the academics are managed with the help of the Vice-Principal, faculty heads, and departmental heads. The Principal along with the Vice-Principal and faculty head conveys the academic matters to the heads of the respective departments. The academic planning like the timetable, conduction of internal assessment, seminar, assignment of workload for teachers and non-teaching staff are done at the departmental level by Heads of the department. The committees like the academic council, curriculum vigilance, internal examination committee, etc. look after the academic affairs and report to the Principal accordingly.

Decentralization of Administration

Apart from the academic matters, some of the administrative matters are assigned to Vice-Principal and

office superintendent to make the functioning efficient and time-saving. The office superintendent is the executive head of the administrative unit; hence the distribution of office administrative work and its monitoring is done accordingly. In exceptional cases, the delegation of power to sanction leaves and executing administrative discussion are designated to the Vice-Principal.

Case Study: Road Safety Mission

As the Road Safety Mission was an outcome of IQAC's suggestion and has become a continuous practice of our college, it can be looked at as best practice. To execute the campaign, the IQAC puts a perspective planning in the IQAC general meet, where the Principal and the criterion head forward suggestions and unanimously the plan is finalized. Road Safety Committee is formed by the Principal where the faculties and the students serve as Road Safety volunteers. A series of Road Safety activities are organized as per the prepared schedule. In Road Safety Mission, a similar process was followed and different committees are allotted for efficient execution. 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Response:

The college made a perspective (Strategic) plan considering the five years as a post-reaccreditation step for the overall development of the college. 'To educate, encourage, empower the girls and boys of this rural and tribal area' is the vision of our institution and adhering to this vision, all efforts and initiatives have been taken to develop strategies for the betterment of the stakeholders especially students, teachers and the society at large. There are various committees in the college that are effectively working under the guidance of the IQAC to turn the perspective plans into reality.

Example of strategic plan turning into certainty: Institutions of Higher Learning, Research and Specialized Studies in the Subject Zoology and Geology

The inception of the center of higher learning in the Zoology department on 07/01/2021 is a notable example of the successfully implemented activity that has the involvement of the various committees.

Procedure adopted:

1. Department of Zoology and Geology is the flourishing science department considering the strength of the student, research-oriented faculty, and research publication. It was a long-standing demand of the students that there should be a center of higher learning in Zoology and Geology as the scope is available in nearby industries and educational institutes especially for the candidates having Ph.D. in Zoology and Geology. Looking to the demand of students, the IQAC in consultation with CDC decided to go for recognition as "Institutions of Higher Learning, Research and Specialized Studies in the subject Zoology and Geology.

2. The respective departments have prepared and submitted a proposal through the Principal to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli within the stipulated period. The consistent follow-up was taken by the college administrative office in this regard. As a part of this CDC allocated funds for the construction of well-equipped and advanced laboratories and it was decided to purchase some necessary equipment. The college built modern laboratories.

3. The expert committee visited the Zoology and Geology lab for scrutinizing the available infrastructural facilities, academics and research ambiance, administrative and financial strength on dated 10/12/2020.

4. The report submitted by the expert committee was considered and approved by the Board of Deans under the provision of section 37 (1)L of the Maharashtra Public University Act 2016 on dated 29/12/2020 and by the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor on the behalf of the academic council Maharashtra Public University Act 2016 under section 12(7) on dated 06/01/2021.

5. After receiving approval for Institutions of Higher Learning, Research, and Specialized Studies in the subject Zoology from Gondwana University on 07/01/2021, the college acted accordingly. Currently Miss. Anagha S. Devhari has registered for the Ph.D. program in Zoology research center under the supervision of Dr. Ganpat D. Deshmukh.

The approval for Geology is on hold due to the non-fulfillment of the associate guide criterion.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response:

The executive management body of Manoharbai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Armori's and the College Development Committee of Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science & Late N. P. Commerce College articulate together to approve and monitor the policies and plans in agreement with the Government of Maharashtra, Gondwana University, and UGC for the efficient functioning of the institution.

Executive Management Body: It is the topmost syndicate including 11 members who monitor and approve the various developmental plans for the college. At the same time, some of them being active members of the College Development Committee, directly put suggestions regarding more specific agendas about college functioning.

College Development Committee: As per Maharashtra University Act, 2016, a College Development Committee (CDC) has been constituted in the college. It sanctions the annual budget and financial statements, discusses the academic progress of the institution, suggests the administration for the up-gradation of the teaching-learning process, new appointments, augmentation of the infrastructure, facelift of the laboratories with the introduction of the research center and maintenance, etc.

Principal and Institutional Administration: The Principal is the chief administrative officer and monitors administrative and academic activities. The Vice-Principal and office superintendent along with office staff help the Principal in the administrative matters. The administration observes works related to admissions, examinations, scholarships, daily correspondence with the university, concerning government offices, etc. The departmental heads and faculty members of all the departments execute the teaching-learning and evaluation processes. The well-drafted portfolio looks after the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the college in a well-planned manner. A list of various committees is mentioned in the prospectus for general information. The prospectus is uploaded on the institutional website.

Service Rules, Procedures, Recruitment, and Promotion: The institution follows the rules and regulations of the UGC, Revised Maharashtra Public University Act: 2016 and Gondwana University, Gadchiroli for the recruitment and grievances redressal. The promotional policy of the institution is transparent and impartial. The promotional procedure for teaching faculty is based on PBAS recommended by UGC and the affiliated university. IQAC monitors and co-operates in the process of the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS). The Confidential Reports of non-teaching staff is prepared by the head of the institution and sanctioned by CDC for promotion to higher positions.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism: The institution has formed a centralized Grievance Redressal system

for staff, women, and students to redress their grievances. The Principal is the head of this cell and other mechanisms to deal with the situation. After receiving grievances and complaints, either in writing or oral form, the committee conducts a meeting to discuss the issues and resolve them. To prevent cases of sexual harassment and to look into grievances of girl students, the institution has constituted Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) as per the norms of the National Commission.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The well-being of the staff is an important factor for the overall development of the institution. The overall performance of the institution in every front is directly relational to the mental and physical efficiency of the staff. The institution effectively provides several welfare schemes for all teaching, non-teaching staff, and supporting staff so that a healthy working environment can be achieved. Following are the welfare initiatives taken by the institute;

Welfares Through Financial Assistance

- Credit Co-operative Society (a registered body) is the first. The staff can avail of loans, including emergency loans from the society to meet the financial needs. To date, 64 staff members are members of the cooperative society. All members have availed of financial assistance.
- The staff raises a fund through the college and Credit Co-operative Society for an employee in distress to tide over the situation through Staff Welfare Fund.
- The college is also providing a group insurance scheme GSLI to its staff.
- Facilitating staff for getting loans against their GPF.
- The staff may apply for a home loan/ consumer loan to different banks with the guarantee by the Principal that the refund will be done by installments from the salary payment.

Academic Assistance/Recognitions

- The study leaves under Faculty Development Programme. One faculty member availed of this facility.
- Availing UGC/ Government schemes.
- Teachers on achieving some degree/recognitions as well as retired employees along with their family are felicitated in public functions held in the college
- Pension case is processed before the retirement of the faculties

Mediclaim

- Medical reimbursement is done for employees. Four staff, Dr. J.N. Papadkar, Dr. M. M. Thaore, Shri S. L. Rehapade, and Shri H. P. Magare have got medical reimbursement under this scheme and three faculty members have applied for medical reimbursement.

Social and Spiritual

- Special symposia for staff awareness like COVID-19, Road Safety, Medical Checkups, etc.
- Spiritual discourse/ Bhajans commemorating the birthday of Tukadoji Maharaj to instill moral/spiritual values in the staff.
- Occasional yoga sessions for the staff.
- Admissions are given to the wards of teaching and non-teaching staff on a priority basis.
- Birthday greetings through an online platform which are reciprocated with a treat mark the healthy relationship among the staff.

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The college follows the guidelines laid down by the University Grand Commission (UGC) regarding the assessment of the performance of the teacher. The college has formed the Academic Performance Indicator (API) committee, which looks after the appraisal system. It provides guidance regarding the performance-based appraisal system (PBAS). At the end of every academic year, a meeting is conducted under the chairmanship of the Principal to review the work of the committee. The college has developed the system. The committee circulates the notice asking for the submission of the Performance-Based Appraisal System with the required documentation within the deadline. The faculty members fill in the concerned year's performance and get it signed by the respective head of the department. The administrative office collects hard copies of all teaching faculties and handover them to the API committee. API committee does the in-detail assessment of forms considering valid documentation provided. After analyzing individual reports, the API committee recommends the desirable activities to be done by faculties to increase his/her scoring in the points through the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) committee of the college.

After receiving the circulars of the placement by the university, the committee makes the list of the faculties due for placements they are personally guided to meet the requirements to get themselves placed properly. They are helped to fill in the forms. After being signed by the Principal, their applications are submitted for placement and promotion. The procedure has a successful outcome. The following fifteen (13) teachers are placed in a higher grade because of such an efficient mechanism.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

There is a well-drafted mechanism for the fund mobilization and its optimal utilization to keep the various financial assistance in a systematic structure. The College Development Committee is established as per Maharashtra University Act 2016 constituting the President of the executive management body as Chairman along with the Principal of the college as a secretary. The rest members include management representatives, elected teaching and non-teaching representatives, nominated departmental head, and IQAC coordinator. Eligibility for Funds

The institution is affiliated to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, and aided by the Govt. of Maharashtra and comprised under sections 2(f) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act, 1956. The institution generates financial resources through Affiliated university and UGC to carry out the activities like sports events, NSS, organization of research festival, youth festival, seminars/workshops/conferences, various competitions on awareness, earn and learn scheme, personality development workshop, minor research project fund. Forest department fund, College development fund from UGC, Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Limited (HPCL) fund, self-finance courses, a donation from pass-out students and alumni, etc.

Mobilization and Optimal Utilization of Funds

There are two sections in the financial structure of our institution viz., Grant-in-aid and self-financing. The grant section includes research project expenses, fees to the university, equipment, etc. whereas the self-financing includes civil works, electricity and other facility charges, traveling, etc. The expenditures from these two sections are done through the sanctioning of the college development committee's general body meeting. Simultaneously, the college development committee general body meet also looks after the expenditures made.

The administration tries to collect the new resources for funds for students' development and requirements, miscellaneous maintenance, etc. The institution has created the Staff Welfare Fund and it is generated every year by the contribution of the teaching staff. It is utilized for humanitarian objectives like aid for medical purposes. Response:

As the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is the initiator of quality culture, each and every quality initiative are incepted through it. As the teaching-learning process is a core of Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), the IQAC keeps continuous monitoring over it, to record the lacunas and to incept the

respective remedies in form of increments. The IQAC traditionally monitors the teaching-learning process through the regular co-curricular diary checkup by IQAC constituted committee. During the course of time, a need for more vigorous monitoring was sought and as a consequence, the CURRICULUM VIGILANCE COMMITTEE was established in the session of 2018-2019 on the suggestion of the IQAC. This committee was fully dedicated to monitoring the teaching-learning process and respective recordings so that an analytical approach can be achieved for increments required.

Some Incremental Improvements:

- 1. Student Centric Learning Methods:** The IQAC has sought feedback from various stakeholders and through discussion, a committee was formed to draft the guidelines for the student-centric learning methods. Accordingly, the committee drafted guidelines that were approved and implemented for teaching-learning from 2019 onwards. This has made activities like group discussions, student seminars, flip teaching, project-based learning very frequent.
- 2. Remedial and Boosters:** As an incremental step in already existing remedial coaching, the boosters were suggested and a guideline named Academic Sustenance System was drafted through the IQAC's initiative. The guidelines were implemented from the even semester of 2018-2019 and the remedial (for slow learners) and boosters (for advanced learners) were coming into full fledge.
- 3. Drafting and Evaluations of Outcomes:** The IQAC has decided to make a systematic mechanism for the POs, PSOs, and COs communication to all stakeholders (especially students). The outcomes of each and every programme and course were drafted and the faculty were encouraged to make the respective online video of COs. The same has been uploaded on the institutional website for public access. Similarly, a mechanism to evaluate the outcomes attainments has been developed and is executed through various committees.
- 4. Virtual Teaching-Learning:** The hard time of the COVID-19 pandemic has motivated the IQAC to take certain crucial initiatives regarding the continuous flowage of knowledge. On a rigorous discussion with the curriculum vigilance committee, teaching staff, and students, the virtual transaction in the academic process was decided to implement. A duly drafted strategy was implemented and was continuously monitored by the component committee.

4.1 Online Teaching-Learning: Looking at the projected challenges in the COVID-19 pandemic, the IQAC has vigorously churned the probable idea of virtual transactions in the academic process. Through discussion and feedback from stakeholders in one way or another, the ZOOM meeting and Google form were unanimously selected for the teaching-learning and evaluation process respectively. All the teaching-learning transactions were done on the online platform named ZOOM during the COVID-19 pandemic to keep the process unceasing. The entire curriculum was delivered through ZOOM and the record was kept to develop it as an e-resource. The IQAC has also assured that no student should be kept un-benefited during the entire COVID-19 pandemic, except in special cases.

4.2 Online Evaluation: The evaluations of the teaching-learning process are an obligatory process and have to be taken care of with due precision. All the internal assessments during the COVID-19 pandemic were conducted through the platforms viz., google form, and ZOOM. The unit tests were taken by the google form which is an effecting tool to conduct the quiz-type activity. The rest of the assessments like seminars, group discussions, etc. was executed through the ZOOM meeting app. The IQAC has directed the staff to make sure the maximum participation of students. In case of any loophole in the assessment process, IQAC is directed to take appropriate actions accordingly.

4.3 Online Remedial Coaching - Being equally responsible for all sorts of diversities in students, the IQAC of our college first time undertook the initiative for slow learners through an online remedial classes scheme in and after the COVID-19 pandemic. The slow learners were asked to input the doubts through the online mechanism against which the classes were planned. Simultaneously advanced learners were also benefited by this scheme.

The college promotes students and staff members to minimize the wastages of different kinds, as far as possible to reuse the materials e.g,

- Instead of using CDs, DVDs, the use of pen drives reduces the waste,
- Papers are printed in emergent condition. The initiatives taken by the institute to make the campus eco-friendly are as follows

- **Solid waste management**

The garden waste, garbage, paper, e-waste and laboratory waste are segregated as per the need. Waste generation from tree droppings management is a major solid waste generated in the campus. The waste material in the college is collected by the Local Municipal Corporation which recycles the same in its waste treatment plant of Armori. The biodegradable waste from college campus is converted into the vermicompost, an activity run by Zoology department. After completion of the process, vermicompost is used as manure in the garden and ornamental plants on college campus. In an average 180 kg of compost is harvested every year.

Single sided used papers are reused for writing and printing in office. Internal assignment and practical record, newspapers are sold to waste paper vender. Metal, wood, glass and plastic scrap collected from laboratories, library, office and college campus is given to scrap dealer for recycling. Signboard and Posters are displayed on the College campus for encouraging ideas of a plastic free environment. Dust bins for collection of solid waste are placed at suitable places on the campus.

Organize awareness programs for the college students so that they can spread valuable message in the society to become a clean and green environment. The students also participate in different cleaning campaigns to set the noble example as a good volunteer before society.

- ***Liquid waste management***

The liquid waste from the College is connected to *Nagarparishd* sewage system.

- ***Biomedical Waste Management-*** No Biomedical waste produced

- ***E-waste Management***

Regular maintenance of electronic equipments and computers ensures longer life. All the miscellaneous e-waste such as CDs, batteries, and electronic items are collected from every department and office and delivered for safe disposal. Useful parts of electronic gadgets like hard disk, CPU, monitors, CD drive etc have been removed from the old computers for reuse.

- ***Waste Recycling System***

The used internal assessment books, practical records, newspapers etc are sold to the local vendors and those are sent by them to the industries for recycling purpose.

- ***Hazardous Chemicals and Radioactive Waste Management***

Hazardous liquid waste produced during experimental work in laboratories like acids and alkalis are diluted with water and neutralized with weak alkalis is properly disposed of with taking care of adverse side effects of environment. The pipettes and other glassware are collected in a separate container containing disinfectant before they are autoclaved at 1210c.

Certificate Course in Human Rights- This course has been designed to give students an insight of perspectives of Human Rights. The course enhances their expertise over the subject and will be an important value addition to the CV (Curriculum vitae). The study group comprises Principal and subject experts from the college, particularly the faculty with specialization in human rights. Human rights and freedom, Rules of law, equality respect and superiority of constitution in the national life.

College observes **Good Governance Day** (Atalbihari Bajpeyi's Birth Anniverssary) in which the oath of saving constitutional values is taken. The expert talks regarding fundamental rights and duties are arranged so that the staff and students should aware of the constitution of India, the duties and responsibilities of the citizens and Late Atalbihari Bajpeyi's contribution for the betterment and development of our nation.

'Workshop on Road Safety Traffic Law- In order to sensitize the students and staff about traffic awareness and road safety, the college conducts workshop on Road Safety Traffic Law' under **ROAD SAFETY MISSION** every year in collaboration with RTO office Gadchiroli, Legal Services Authority Gadchiroli and Police Station Armori

Objectives of practice

To sensitize the students and staff regarding road safety, traffic awareness with the sole objective **TO AVOID ACCIDENTS.**

The Context

Developed Roads are the prime need of the development of any country. As the roads develop traffic on it is also increased significantly. A number of cases of accidents are also increased because of negligence of traffic rules by the civilians. One way to minimize such cases is to make aware civilians about road safety. The college has taken initiative in this regard. The principal appointed Prof. N. N. Meshram as Road Safety Co-ordinator and also formed Road Safety Committee for conducting 32nd Road Safety Campaign during

the year 2020-21 and also from 2016 to 2020.

The Practice

Under 'Road Safety Campaign', the college organized a variety of activities. Road Safety Programmes held during year 2016-17-2021-22 are:

- 'One Day Workshop on Road Safety Traffic Law'. (Date 16th Feb. 2021)
- Guidance to Taxi Drivers and sticking reflectors to vehicles. (Date 17th Feb. 2021)
- Mega Learning Licences camp (4/12/2021 to 31/12/2021)
- Road Safety Poster Exhibition.
- Road Safety Rally.
- Licence Survey.
- Distribution of Road Safety Manual.
- Bush cutting by road safety volunteers
- Regional Transport Officer's awareness programmes regarding Road Safety
- Blood donation camp.
- Road safety volunteer Filling of pothole on roads.
- Guidance on Accidents, and accidental insurance.

Our Road Safety volunteers donate their blood and save the lives of accident affected people. Whenever accidents happen in area nearby *Armori*, our Road Safety volunteers reach on time and take accident affected people to the hospital and thus render valuable community service. Our Road Safety Mission linked our Road Safety volunteers' educational lives with social service and they have taken Oath to be lifelong volunteers of Road Safety.

Evidence of Success

- Entire stakeholders got consciousness while driving on roads.
- Knowledge of emergency treatment.
- People of the locality got knowledge of road safety like wearing helmet while driving and keep proper document e. g. driving licence, insurance paper, registration details.
- Students learnt how to handle the situation after road accidents and ethics.
- Students and individuals gained knowledge about signs and symbols.
- Students learnt about online process of learning licence.
- People of the locality and Taxi drivers got knowledge of road safety like attaching seat belt and follow road signals while driving and keep proper documents e.g., driving licence, insurance paper, registration details etc.
- Students get acquainted about how to avoid accidents and be a nice, attentive driver.
- Students became aware about how to deal with first aid and different types of bandages.
- Students came to a general conclusion that accidents can be avoided.
- Our Road Safety Volunteers enthusiastically participated in all these activities. **Shri. Ravindra**

Bhuyar, Regional Transport Officer, Gadchiroli rewarded our college with **5000/- Rs.** for effective presentation of Road Safety Street play. **Regional Transport Office, Gadchiroli** awarded our college for creating massive awareness about road safety and traffic rules.

Problems, Resources

Due to Covid-19 pandemic situation we could not conduct all the planned activities regarding road safety and traffic awareness. Another problem we visualized was the time slot for activity. Our main stakeholders are our students and our enthusiastic staff were engaged in online teaching learning, but in the month of February and March when the students were physically present in college, we managed to conduct many road safety activities and tried to create road safety awareness among students and society.

Note: - The Road Safety committee vigorously implemented 32nd Road safety mission and organized a range of road safety activities during 2020-21 and the college has taken initiative for sensitizing the people of nearby area about road safety and traffic awareness. Our road safety is no longer a Campaign but we have converted road safety Campaign into a mission.

Best Practice II:

Title: - Fostering Social Responsibility

a). Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (U.B.A.)

Objectives of practice

- To create awareness regarding social issues.
- To install service attitude and confidence among students in their ability to contribute to the well-being of others.
- To contribute for the betterment of Society

The Context

The college is located in tribal and backward area. People of our area lack in health awareness, they believe in superstitions and not aware of development schemes. The trend of alcoholism is increasing day by day in the society destroying their personal and social health. We are aware that the purpose of education is to make students and villagers good citizens. All of our students and staff are fully involved in community service activities organized under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (U.B.A.).

The Practice

Under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan 2.0. (AISHE Code-C-18355), *Palasgaon* of block *Armorli*, district *Gadchiroli* is adopted. Number of meetings were arranged with local authorities like *Mahila Bachat Gat*, *Gramsevak*, *Talathi* with our *Yuvas*. Students are educated regarding health, education, economy, agriculture and various aspects of village development under UBA scheme. As Covid -19 outbreak Virtual awareness campaign for fit India freedom and fit India movement as per NSS guideline organized in the college. In

My family my responsibility campaign through online guidance about hundred students participated in tree plantation programme nearby their area. They resolved to stop Covid-19 by taking oath. Public awareness camp on Government schemes was held at Antarji. Organizing Blood Donation Camp at Mahatma Gandhi College Armori. Water Literacy Campaign 2021-e- Training Workshop on ground water recharge. Distribution of free fruit tree in adopted villages Palora, Antarji, Rampuri. Organizing Online. Personality Development eight days workshop for students.

Evidence of Success

The target behind UBA was to sensitize staff and students with respect to the community service. The NSS unit of college confirmed its benchmarks regarding the quality and beneficial activities to be conducted for the development of the rural area under UBA. The students and the staff got awareness about the various problems confronting before the rural villagers while making different surveys and field visits.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

b). Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization.

Objectives of practice

To sensitize students and staff regarding women empowerment and gender sensitization and to aware the girls students of the institution regarding the safety measures to be undertaken for their better life aiming at their holistic development.

The Context

There is an alarming rise in violence against women. As citizens of India, it is our primary duty to uphold the values of equality, liberty, justice and fraternity enshrined in our constitution. For this, the college formed Women Development Cell. This cell prepared their annual action plan which has its focus on girl students and female staff, their empowerment, and their curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular development.

The Practice

Our target behind Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization was to empower the girls students of the college and sensitize all stakeholders about the respectful and parallel status of women in the society. The confidence gained by our girls students through various activities organized by women development cell is a clear evidence of our success and we hope this women empowerment will surely be having long lasting effect in their lives.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

To lift up girl students of tribal and rural area is a challenging task. Firstly, the women empowerment cell of college sensitized girl students for their personality development by organizing online programmes. By organizing some holistic development activities this committee succeeded in gaining girl students' confidence.

The students became aware of the importance of work culture, labour, the problems and difficulties faced by the villagers. The girls and boys students became aware of the equality between men and women and all the stakeholders are trying their best to serve the villagers in particular and the community in general.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

People's Biodiversity Register: A practice that seeds the spirit of Environmental Cognizance among students.

People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) is a document which contains comprehensive information on locally available Bio-resources including landscape and demography of a particular area or village.

Goals:

- To document the traditional knowledge of biodiversity by consultation with local people.
- To promote folk ecological knowledge and wisdom.
- To create environmental consciousness and research attitude among students.
- To create a database of native information with wide implications in local development.

Our Voyage: The PBR is a fully matured best practice of our institution which ultimately turned into our distinctiveness.

Procedure: To achieve the aspired goals, following methodology was adopted which has been refined every forthcoming year.

- Selection - As the native information is at core of PBR, a local village is selected unanimously by Technical Support Group (TSG) every year (Preferably an adopted village) for documentation.
- Allocation - To execute the PBR, various departments are motivated to take their area of proficiency for documentation of the selected village by the assistance of allotted students (particularly second year of Under Graduate).
- Scheming - The departmental team (Teachers and allotted students) jointly scheme the execution of PBR in synchronization with the aimed documentation.
- Village Visit - A set of visits are planned and a systematic operating procedure (SOP) is drafted for the collection of the aspired data. A survey is done during the visit as per the given SOP.
- Data refinement - Once the data is collected through series of visits to the village, the TSG refines the data in consultation to the students involved.
- Drafting and Publishing - After a rigorous refinement, the students transfigure the raw data into a presentable document and is published.

Delineation:

- **Data Source** - The people of the village are more or less rely upon the native knowledge for their livelihood. Their keen sense of observation and a massive bank of inherited knowledge make them a living document of native data. Hence, during the survey the local residents are preferred over the established bookish information. The elderly residents are given high preferences in against to their enormous experience of native knowledge implications.
- **Data comprehensiveness** - The department of Zoology and Botany are the core departments operational over the bio-diversity of the local village and document the respective fauna and flora expansively. These departments strive to keep the data multifaceted and upgraded in every forthcoming attempt. Some facets like insect pest studies, animal diversity and the weed flora associated with crops, floral diversity, etc. The department of Chemistry gathers the data related to the physicochemical data of the water from the village. The department of Geology attempts to study the groundwater facets like static water level, local aquifer and general geology in and around the village. The department of Physics collects the individual household data of electricity consumptions from the village to chalk the respective energy consumption. Apart from this the departments of humanity including Geography, Sociology, Political Science, Economics, History, Music and Languages (English and Marathi) also conduct the socio-economic surveys as an augmentation in PBR. The department of Geography executes the household agro-economic surveys to understand the agricultural setups of the village, where the department of Sociology tries to comprehend the sociological practices in the village, the department of History observes the historical background of it. Similarly the department of Political Science collects the data of various government schemes implemented in the village and the department of Economics goes on for household economic surveys in the village. The department of Music endeavors to record the folk songs of the village. While the department of Language evaluate the village's day today language transactions.

Villages endeavored since inception:

- **Kasvi (2016-17)**
- **Kasvi (2017-18)**
- **Antarji (2018-19)**
- **Aastha (2018-19)**
- **Rampuri (2019-20)**
- **Palora (2019-20)**
- **Palasgaon (2020-21)**

Extension events associated to PBR:

- One day workshop on **“Recent Advances in People’s Biodiversity Register”**
- One Day National e-Seminar on **“Impact of COVID-19 on Conservation of Biodiversity, Environment and Water Resources” (Dated: -3rd December 2020)** - The e-Seminar was aimed to provide a platform to discuss various issues related to biodiversity including endangered birds, recent scenario of PBR in COVID-19, etc.
- One day workshop on **“Development of Sustainable Environment in Agricultural Field” (Dated: -29 to 31 January 2018)** - This was conducted at Kasvi in collaboration with the Government Agriculture College, Gadchiroli and ATMA Gadchiroli.
- **Collaboration with Nagar Palika Armori for PBR** - As per Government of Maharashtra’s initiative, the Nagar Palika was asked to prepare the PBR of the area in the jurisdiction of it. As a

consequence, the CEO, Armori Nagar Palika has signed an agreement with Environment Study Centre of our institute.

Implications:

- **Students** - The students have developed observation, data collection, Analysis and drafting skills. This has also imbibed a research temperament among them.
- **Teachers** - The teachers are oriented about the methodologies regarding the application of classroom knowledge in the field with inter-disciplinary approaches.
- **Locals** - The traditional knowledge of locals was explored and was entangled with the scientific domain to squeeze maximum out of it.
- **Researchers** - The PBR has also provided novel avenues for researches.
- **Government Officials and Policy Makers** - The data generated in form of PBR is quite helpful in various government initiatives and policy framings.
- **Direct Benefits** - A huge document of native knowledge has been preserved and is now open accessed. The traditional and folk knowledge has been duly appreciated by District Collector **Nayak Sir** and assured that PBR will be published and get benefitted for public domain. The students are trained enough to conduct such scientific endeavors for the conservation of the environment.

Future Plans:

- Correlation between Lab and field
- Exchange between Traditional knowledge and Scientific knowledge
- Creating a database for future reference and its digitization open access to public.
